From the Directors

Holiness is more than separation from the world – we also have to be joined to God who alone is intrinsically holy. There is nothing in this hour we need more than to see His Holiness which forms, transforms and defines who we are and who He is.



Congratulations to the graduating class of the School of Ministry, Autumn Term 2017! It has been our privilege to have served you in the Bible College of Wales.

The theme you have chosen for your graduation, “Set Apart”, is so apt for what God wants to do in and through us. Paul says in 2 Timothy 2:20, “But in a great house there are not only vessels of gold and silver, but also of wood and clay, some for honour and some for dishonour. Therefore, if anyone cleanses himself from the latter, he will be a vessel for honour, sanctified and useful for the master, prepared for every good work.” The key point is in the phrase, “cleanse himself from the latter” because the central issue in our lives is about holiness.

The great Welsh Preacher Martyn Lloyd-Jones once said, “What would happen in our day if believers were to get honest about their sin and serious about pursuing holiness? Might we not once again experience the manifest presence of God in our churches?” Wow, think about that! The pursuit of holiness is a lifelong journey and pursuit, but it begins as the believer consecrates or sets himself apart for the Lord.

In Leviticus 19:2, it says, “You shall be holy, for I the Lord your God am holy”. When God parts His lips, the first thing He mentions about Himself is His holiness. He is the thrice holy God. In heaven, the angels and saints cry “Holy, holy, holy is the Lord”, and they do not cease. Holiness is probably the greatest intrinsic attribute of God and the greatest jewel in our crown. I would like to share three statements on holiness.

1. There is a difference between innocence and holiness.

Holiness is innocence that has been tried and tested. Adam was created in a state of innocence, having no understanding of what was right or wrong. However, God does not just want innocence. We do not sing “innocent, innocent, innocent is the Lord”, do we? He wants

holiness and this is only possible through trials whereby the person being tested chooses the good and refuses the evil. This was what God wanted to teach Adam in the garden of Eden, yet we are familiar with the tragic ending of this story – Adam chose to disobey. The moment he partook of the fruit, he became aware of good and evil. He lost his innocence and he saw his nakedness.

From this Genesis episode, we have the tendency to talk about Adam making the wrong choice, Eve’s disobedience, or the serpent’s treachery, but we neglect to see the one person whose heart was shattered. When Adam chose Eve over God, God’s heart was crushed. That is why the first commandment above all is to love the Lord our God with all our heart, strength, might and soul. God must be first and pre-eminent in our lives.

2. There is a difference between righteousness and holiness.

Romans 6:19 tells us, “For just as you presented your members as slaves of uncleanness, and of lawlessness leading to more lawlessness, so now present your members as slaves of righteousness for holiness.” Righteousness is the baseline and starting point for the Christian life and that is how we enter the kingdom. The Christian receives salvation through believing in his heart, and it is accounted to him for righteousness. Following which is water baptism, and Jesus Himself said that water baptism is an act of righteousness. When we take little steps in righteousness, we grow in it, because our salvation is predicated on us continually walking in righteousness. However, we cannot stop at righteousness – it must eventually lead us to holiness.

A good example of this is Lot. Lot was a righteous man according to the Scriptures, but he was not a holy man. He was comfortable being in Sodom and Gomorrah, a perverse environment that God found abominable. In spite of being vexed by what he witnessed going on around him, he did not want to leave. He was comfortable in the place of immorality, and the result was that he lost everything. Righteousness will deliver us but it is insufficient if we seek a deeper walk with God.

The true Christian ideal is not to be happy, but to be holy. If you have to choose between happiness or holiness, choose holiness.



We must not stop at righteousness and pursue holiness, without which, no man shall see God (Heb 12:14).

3. There are varying degrees of holiness.

“He who is unjust, let him be unjust still; he who is filthy, let him be filthy still; he who is righteous, let him be righteous still; he who is holy, let him be holy still.” (Rev 22:11) This is one of the final warnings from the Lord to His Beloved Church in the last book of the Bible, describing the conditions prior to the return of Jesus Christ. If we profess to love the Lord, we ought to long for His coming with a passion. Anybody who is indifferent about His return hardly qualifies to be part of the Bride. In these last days, the dichotomy between holiness and filthiness will widen. The wicked will commit greater iniquity and the holy will live in greater sanctification and separation, and there will be a marked distinction.

Holiness is an aspect of God’s nature that is without parallel anywhere in the universe. The Bible gives us many interesting aspects of God’s character: He is good, He is wisdom, He is love, etc. As we look at the world in which we live, we can find people that demonstrate these virtues in some measure. We know people who may have a great sense of justice, people who are longsuffering, people who are morally upright. But when it comes to holiness, there is nothing outside of God that can lay claim to this. Holiness belongs to Him. The Hebrew root word is “Qadosh”, and it means to be ‘cut off’ or to be separated from the rest. The Greek word is “Hagios” and it simply means, different from the world. The word holy is sometimes translated hallowed or sanctified.

There are two processes involved: firstly, a separation from the world, flesh and the devil, secondly, a separation unto God. Holiness is more than separation from the world – we also have to be joined to God who alone is intrinsically holy. There is nothing in this hour we need more than to see His Holiness which forms, transforms and defines who we are and who He is.

As you graduate, may the Lord give you an increasing desire for holiness and purity. Charles Spurgeon sums it up brilliantly in this quote, “I believe the holier a man becomes, the more he mourns over the unholiness which remains in him.” The true Christian ideal is not to be happy, but to be holy. If you have to choose between happiness or holiness, choose holiness. A lot of people want to be happy now, and holiness in the next life, but if you will choose holiness now, you are guaranteed to be happy in the next. May the Lord bless you all richly in your ongoing journey. You are a wonderful cohort of students and on behalf of the leadership of the school, we bless you in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

From the Dean

From the first day of orientation through the duration of the term, there has been a distinct and clear sense of the Holy Spirit's guidance upon the class. The scheduled modules and appointed lecturers flowed in a stream which took the class from one realm of glory to another. At its core was an underlying foundation of holiness and the fear of the Lord. The chosen theme, "Set Apart," is but a natural outflow of the class experience. It is especially important to weigh carefully what this entails as a student setting forth from the BCW, considering the day and hour in which we live.

Today's world is awash in confusion and chaos. The sad reality is that this is having an increasing effect upon the church. The church should be the beacon of hope, light and direction. Israel of old had the responsibility to be set apart as an example for other nations. Notice carefully the indictment spoken by Ezekiel in a day very much like our own:

Eze 5:5-6

Thus saith the Lord GOD; This is Jerusalem: I have set it in the midst of the nations and countries that are round about her. And she hath changed my judgments into wickedness more than the nations, and my statutes more than the countries that are round about her: for they have refused my judgments and my statutes, they have not walked in them.

The message of being "set apart" is consistently seen from Genesis through Revelation. There were defining moments when God sought to separate a people unto Himself. How many separated themselves to the Word of the Lord in the days of Noah? God told his people to separate themselves from Korah at the time of his rebellion against Moses (Num 16:21). In the last days, the Lord implores His people to come out of Babylon and its worldly system (Rev 18:4). The scriptural example that has apprehended me these past 3 months is the following declarative question that Moses asked the children of Israel. "Who is on the Lord's side?" (Exo 32:26) It was here the Levites separated and set apart themselves from their brethren. You may also recall during this time that the children of Israel were serving God on their terms (Exo 32:1-6). That was all about to change and so it will be today! Can the following be said of us as was stated to Levi?

Mal 2:5-7

My covenant was with him of life and peace; and I gave them to him for the fear wherewith he feared me, and was afraid before my name. The law of truth was in his mouth, and iniquity was not found in his lips: he walked with me in peace and equity, and did turn many away from iniquity. For the priest's lips should keep knowledge, and they should seek the law at his mouth: for he is the messenger of the LORD of hosts.

Will we take up the challenge and answer the call? The lectures, time of prayer, devotionals and chapel services have been consistent on the themes of "Holiness" and the "Fear of the Lord." These two themes require a choosing and willingness to be set apart. I have been encouraged in witnessing first-hand your honesty and transparency in making that choice. I congratulate you on making the choice to attend the BCW these past few months and for choosing to be set apart for the Lord's purposes in the days to come (2 Tim 2:21). The following priestly song represents my sentiments and prayer for you as you go forth:

Committed

On the plane ride here from Singapore, I asked myself repeatedly, “Why are you coming here, Elijah?” I knew that the three months in the BCW would pass quickly in the twinkling of an eye if I did not purpose and resolve to be transformed by His power and grace, and not mere theological knowledge. This very question lingered in my mind, and during our first prayer meeting in class the Lord asked me clearly, “Do you want to be involved or committed? Both are permissible, but if you choose to be committed, I will take you higher, but it will be painful.”

There is a stark difference between involvement and commitment. Involvement is the act of participating in various activities - attending lectures, prayer meetings, and street outreaches. Involvement says, “Look at how busy I am with the Kingdom of God!”, but in reality, it is not about Him but self-gratification. In essence, involvement is a facade, like the rich young ruler in Matthew 19 who thought he could enter into eternal life through his works, but refused to accept what Jesus really wanted – first place in his heart!

Commitment, on the other hand, comes with a high price. Commitment is answering His call no matter how difficult or inconvenient. Like the scenario in Song of Solomon 5:3, the lover knocks on the door of his beloved, but she dismisses him instead, saying, “I have taken off my coat. How can I put it back on? I have washed my feet. How can I get them dirty again?” Commitment says ‘yes’ and allows God to put His finger on certain issues in my heart kept under lock and key, and surrendering all rights to hold that key. Commitment is also a confession of the hidden things, allowing God to deal not only with our deeds, but also our intentions.

All revelation warrants a response – and my response to Him that very day was that I would be committed. I would accept the anguish, sorrow, and repentance which might come when the Lord reveals what He wants me to change. If we desire to come up higher with Him, we need to be committed, not just superficially involved!

In the Bible, the prophet Isaiah received a fresh revelation of the Lord in Isaiah 6:1, where it says, “In the year that King Uzziah died, I saw also the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up, and His train filled the temple.” When the glory of God filled the temple, Isaiah’s eyes were opened to see the King, the Lord of Hosts right before him. Then, in the light of the glory of God, Isaiah saw himself – unworthy and depraved in the presence of an almighty and holy God. He began to say, “Woe is me,” and repented of his sins, despite being the national representative who brought people’s offerings before the Lord! It is imperative, even to the most mature believer, to be aware of our corrupt and sinful nature in the light of God’s awesome purity.

Isaiah was not a new believer, yet he still repented – he realised for the first time that his lips were not consecrated. One of the seraphims took a coal from off the altar and when this coal touched Isaiah’s lips, it brought a new cleansing to what would proceed from his lips. From then onwards, God commissioned him in a new way

to speak to His people, and from chapter 7 onwards, Isaiah began to prophesy about the Messiah who was to come 700 years later!

The appearance of the fiery coal approaching his mouth must have been unnerving - if I were Isaiah, I may have shunned the coal! Yet we must understand that commitment brings about discomfort. He has been pinpointing issues in my life that are not pleasing before Him. He told me to confess and to repent publicly before my classmates about my pride and my speech – whether it was being rude to others, or complaining and grumbling about little things. I struggled to do so but a breakthrough came when I obeyed and said yes. May God grant that we, as His messengers, are purged from all foolishness of speech, and speak only words that will bring Him glory.

God desires to give all of us a fresh anointing and commissioning to accomplish His purposes. However, this new work must be preceded by a fresh repentance in our lives – we may graduate from a Bible College but we must never graduate from the school of repentance. God can do a deep work in our lives if we continue to yield to his moulding and remain committed, even if it means carrying the cross. It is my desire to have Psalms 84:7 inscribed upon my heart: “They go from strength to strength, till each appears before God in Zion.”

FOR MY FATHER'S PLEASURE

You chose the better thing between staying fearful and stepping out. You risked being wrong for the sake of obedience.

As I walk this journey of life with God, I comprehend with greater depth the limitations of our earthly, cultural worldviews in grasping a transcendental God. I grew up in Singapore – buffed and polished by an achievement-oriented education system that offers the security of being able to master anything I do not understand, and sail through life with honest, straightforward grit. However, the beauty and complexity of God is that He does not fit into the broken boxes of our worldly systems. I cannot “be better” at Bible College by taking ten test papers from previous years, nor does God provide an answer key to my life decisions.

One of my greatest struggles was overcoming the lie that I could not hear God’s voice – a problem I encountered when seeking the aforementioned answer key on my quest for a perfect and problem-free life, or, as I called it, “God’s will.” After all, I was solid flesh and bones, hewn from the blunt stone of rationality and scepticism – how could I catch the wispy thoughts of a God of Spirit and stillness? I came to the BCW disheartened from some regular instances when I was unable to discern God’s voice and from the sensation of feeling around in the fog for something solid every time I tried.

Ironically, my breakthrough came when I clearly heard God challenge me on this issue during a prayer meeting: I felt that I had a message to share but resisted stepping up to the microphone because of fear. I feared the vulnerability of speaking before my lecturers and classmates – that I would not phrase my prayer correctly or fail to use the right Christian lingo enough for all the men and women of God around me. Most of all, I feared that I had not heard God accurately and did not want to make a mistake in public. Eventually, I did go up to the microphone and share my message, but was squirming inwardly for the rest of the prayer meeting. Amidst the loud voices of my insecurities, God’s stern but loving voice came with great clarity:

“You chose the better thing between staying fearful and stepping out. You risked being wrong for the sake of obedience. If you were wrong and I am pleased with you, is that

enough for you? Are you willing to be wrong for My sake? It is your fear of getting it wrong, your perfectionism, and fear of failure that prevent you from hearing My voice.”

It hit me then that while I had boxed God’s voice within the worldly binary of accuracy or inaccuracy, the God of love and faith speaks according to a deeply intangible and far superior logic of His own. As Jesus said, “My sheep hear My voice, and I know them, and they follow Me.” (John 10:27) Just as a bride would recognise her bridegroom’s voice not because of the perfect clarity of his words, but the familiar and loving lilt of his voice – I recognise the voice of my Father not through any definable characteristics but through our intimacy. The pleasure of hearing His voice lies not in catching His every word accurately, but in Him who is speaking.

God reinforced this lesson when I received my first job offer after graduating from university. I panicked and was anxious from the thought of making a mistake by either accepting or rejecting the job. I sought God desperately for the answer when I realised that the root of my anxiety lay in my fear of failure. I was afraid of the pain of making a mistake by accepting the wrong job and somehow missing God’s will for my life. In that moment of honesty, God met me again, in His gentle but firm voice: “Christine, the way the world defines failure is not the way I define failure. If you love Me, you will not fail.” It truly hit me then that all along, I had carried my worldly attitude of perfectionism into my relationship with Jesus. The Kingdom of God, however, operates on a different currency – worship. My highest calling is not to be perfect for God or live perfectly for God; my highest calling is to worship Him with all of myself, for He has set me apart for His pleasure.

With those words, the burden to strive for perfection and to never make a mistake rolled off my shoulders. I was liberated from the world’s tainted measurements of value and free to fail, for I could never be a failure in Christ. I rest simply in my identity as His daughter – imperfect but perfectly loved by my Father.

Then He said to the crowd, “If any of you wants to be My follower, you must give up your own way, take up your cross daily, and follow Me.” (Luke 9:23)



HOW CLOSE IS OUR HEART TO GOD'S HEART?

I have sometimes heard it preached in sermons the need to shorten the distance between the mind and the heart; so that our heart can be in agreement with the truth in our minds. But there is another distance which needs to be shortened; it is the distance between our hearts and God's heart. This distance can also be measured by how we obey two of the greatest commandments God gave to us – to love God with all our heart and to love others as we would ourselves (Matt 22:37-40). To understand this, let us look at the story of two prophets – Jonah and Moses.

Jonah was a prophet and is most commonly associated with his ministry to Nineveh, a city condemned for their iniquity and wickedness. In Jonah 3:4, Jonah declared the judgement of the Lord – Nineveh would be destroyed in forty days. However, he did not call Nineveh into repentance. When the people of Nineveh heard Jonah's message, the fear of the Lord came upon them and they repented from their sins. Because of their humility, "God relented from the disaster that He had said He would bring upon them, and He did not do it." (Jonah 3:10) However, instead of being pleased by the outcome, Jonah became angry that God showed mercy. His reason was explained in the following chapter where he said "Just kill me now, Lord! I'd rather be dead than alive if what I predicted will not happen." (Jonah 4:3)

Clearly, Jonah knew God's compassionate nature but he thought Nineveh's evil made the citizens deserving of God's judgements. What Jonah failed to see was that God's desire for mercy triumphed in this situation. Jonah's self-righteousness and concern for his own reputation

revealed that one can know the ways of God but yet not know God's heart.

On the contrary, Moses, another prophet, understood God's heart. It is mentioned in Exodus 33:11 that "the Lord used to speak to Moses face to face, just as a man speaks to his friend." When Moses was on Mount Sinai receiving the ten commandments from God, the Israelites in the camp at the foot of the mountain committed a great sin by fashioning and worshipping a golden calf. God revealed His plans to Moses, "Now leave me alone so my fierce anger can blaze against them, and I will destroy them. Then I will make you, Moses, into a great nation." (Exo 32:10)

Unlike Jonah, instead of acceding to the judgment, Moses pleaded with God to turn away from His wrath. Moses did not seize this opportunity to achieve greatness for himself but he was more concerned with the honour of God's reputation – the enemies of the Israelites would mock and taunt them! He reminded God of His love and promise to make the descendants of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob into a great nation. Furthermore, despite the hardness of the Israelites' hearts, Moses offered to make atonement for their sins, by giving up his own place in eternity in exchange that Israel may be saved (Exo 32:32). Moses' actions demonstrated the very nature of God's heart and foreshadowed the coming of Christ to atone for the sins of all humanity.

Both prophets loved God and knew who He was and what He wanted. In some ways, we can find Jonah in us; though we love God, we value our desires above His. However, may we learn to be like Moses, whose mind and heart was one with God, and exercise love and compassion to all around us – just like Christ did.

His Whirlwind

From my first moments at the BCW, I have felt as though I have been placed within the Lord's purifying whirlwind. The force of this wind has been driving away and uprooting things in me to sanctify me deeper still, and make me a vessel fit for the Master's use to effectively serve Him in these last days. It is like the Scripture in Hebrews 12:27 that describes "The removing of those things that are shaken...that those things which cannot be shaken may remain." He is calling out thoughts and attitudes, some of which I was not aware that I possessed, and others which I thought I had dealt with years ago. But now these hidden things are being brought to the surface in His whirlwind, and as I confess and forsake them, I am confident that He is faithful and just to forgive and cleanse me from all unrighteousness (1 John 1:9). This is not an easy experience, nor one that I would naturally seek out, but I would rather have this finished sooner rather than later, and on this side of eternity.

The Bible tells us that "We must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ; that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath done, whether it be good or bad." (2 Cor 5:10) One of the teachers here at the BCW told us that he has a plaque with the word "Eternity" above his desk, and this forms the basis upon which he judges everything that he does. Like him, I want to always ask the question, "Will this stand for eternity?" I want to order my steps accordingly in the remaining days I have been allocated on earth.

The Lord has been graciously using His whirlwind to remove things in me which will not stand for eternity, things without a strong and firm foundation. In Hebrews 12:6 we read, "Whom the Lord loveth He chasteneth, and scourgeth every son whom he receiveth."

In addition to this rather unnerving removal process, the Lord is building me up and revealing His love and tender care for me. I have learnt to submit to Him and give my life as a freewill offering to the One who loved me first, and gave Himself for me. Like a beautiful rose blooming when viewed in a time lapse video, as it opens petal upon petal, petal upon petal, it is both fascinating and beautiful, beyond anything that could be conceived of or created by man. When flowers do not open, they start to droop and wilt as the bud decays, which affects the rest of the plant. This teaches us that we must go forward with the Lord and be willing to yield to Him. We may think that our habitual patterns of self-protection and coping strategies are best, but we need to let go of these and allow Jesus to be our armour and our shield.

The resplendent flowers with unfurled petals in full bloom characterise Christians who have yielded their life to the Lord and are willing to undergo the trials of life as they follow Him, opening their hearts to the Sun of Righteousness. Although this makes flowers susceptible to diverse weather conditions and visits from insects, the end result of these roses, when pollinated, leads to beauty and captivating fragrance which gives eternal pleasure to the Lord. We are encouraged in John 16:33 where it says, "In the world ye shall have tribulation, but be of good cheer, for I have overcome the world".

Tragically, the wilted flowers are Christians who had served the Lord but who have backslidden, and not returned to Him or restored their love relationship with Him. "Nevertheless I have somewhat against thee, because thou hast left thy first love. Remember therefore from whence thou art fallen, and repent, and do the first works; or else I will come unto thee quickly and will remove thy candlestick out of his place, except thou repent." (Rev 1:4-5)

The Lord desires to see all of His children walking fully sanctified and free, but this can only happen if we are open to His dealings with us, even if it means a cleansing whirlwind. He also showers us with His love, such that we can open our hearts to Him and safely trust Him to bring us through this life to our eternal home with Him.

I AM WHO HE SAYS I AM

Recently he said to me, "Mum, did you know God never says 'oops' – He has a perfect plan."

I have two amazing children, Sean and Abi, and I find it a tremendous privilege to be a mother. The great thing about little children is that they believe everything you tell them about who they are. As a parent, it is my responsibility to speak life into my children. There are so many parallels we can draw between the earthly parent-child relationship and the heavenly relationship that we, as children, share with our Father. I want to share the following lesson that I have learned through my 4-year-old son Sean.

I tell Sean all the time how clever he is and that he can be anything he wants to be when he grows up. If I tell him, "You could be an astronaut!", he trusts that I am telling the truth and that I believe in him. Recently he said to me, "Mum, did you know God never says 'oops' - He has a perfect plan." There is no doubt in Sean about who he is and who God is.

Jesus, in His earthly ministry, spoke on many occasions about the importance of displaying some childlike characteristics. In Matthew 18:1-6, His disciples wanted to know, "Who is the greatest in the kingdom?" Jesus responds by calling a little child to come before them and said, "I tell you the truth, unless you change and become like little children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven." Children have a lot to teach us about the kingdom and how we should respond to God our Father.

So what happens as we grow up? We start weighing the affirming words spoken over us in our childhood against the negative or cynical words of what other people say. As we weigh these words, they influence how we form our opinions about the world and our personal belief systems. This is not an exclusively bad thing as it helps us to grow in discernment and aids in decision making.

There is something inherent in the way we learn called, 'the principle of first mention.' The first time we hear information on any given subject, that knowledge becomes the foundation upon which we test everything else we are exposed to on the same topic. For example, if someone says to you, "You are going to meet Bob today, but

do not believe everything he says because he tends to exaggerate.' If this is the 'first mention' you have heard about Bob, this becomes the filter through which you converse with Bob when you meet him. You know nothing about him but suddenly, while you are talking to him, you ask yourself, "I wonder if he's exaggerating?" when you would have never thought that, had not your friend not mentioned that to you. Now that does not mean you are stuck with that opinion forever, but it will take a contrary revelation to change it.

When you accept Christ into your life, you get the opportunity to receive a new 'first mention' over your life. What was said before does not have to be the filter through which you judge all things, instead it is the Word of God that becomes your filter. This is what God calls "the renewing of your mind". Romans 12:2 says, "Do not conform to the pattern of this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your mind. Then you will be able to test and approve what God's will is - His good, pleasing and perfect will." Having child-like faith allows this transformation to occur and to be able to know and accept God's will for our lives.

In Matthew 3:16-17, God affirms Jesus as being His beloved Son. Just after this identity affirmation, Jesus was led into the wilderness where He was tempted by Satan. Satan tested Jesus' identity, but Jesus tells him that life is found only through every word that comes from the mouth of God (Matt 4:1-4). Jesus knew the Word and He believed the Word - the words from the mouth of His Father! When you know and believe the identity you have been given through Christ, it changes everything.

Sometimes, we need God to renew our minds and remind us of who we are over and over again. I do not ever get tired of telling my children how special they are or how much I love them. I delight in telling them over and over again. Today, if you need to ask Him again who He says you are, ask as a little child would - eager to accept the words of a loving Father.

A Psalm 23 Experience

I love the great outdoors. I am also an avid traveller and someone who cannot sit still. By His grace, the Lord has led me from one Bible school to another in order to teach me to “be still and know that He is God” (Psalm 46:10). Having been involved in missions and ministry for the past 7 years had honestly left me tired, burnt out, and longing for rest, which was my reason for coming to Wales. What does rest look like and how can one discern its qualities in the midst of a three month Bible school? A weekend trip to the Brecon Beacons National Park with a few of my classmates helps to give perspective to this question.

Throughout this hike to see four waterfalls, the Lord began to speak to me. For starters, I began to notice that the trek was going to be quite challenging; it seemed to have rained the night before so the terrain was muddy and wet, and I was not wearing the right shoes! The result was that I had to take extra caution by looking carefully at where I was about to step. I was literally walking step by step, being intentional and deliberate on where to put my feet - on this rock, on that thick patch of leaves, so I would not slip or fall. God then brought to remembrance the verse in Psalm 119:105 which says, “He is a light unto my feet and a lamp unto my path”, and revealed that He does not show us the grand blueprint of our lives but more often than not, just small snippets of His masterplan - to know where to place our feet next. I was reassured that even though I may not see or understand His complete purposes or what He has called me to in fullness, I can trust that He is faithful to lead me step by step, season by season.

After we reached the second waterfall, I thought I had seen everything there was to see about waterfalls. I even considered abandoning the hike at this point as I was content with just seeing two, but as we continued, I found that I would have missed out on even more beauty had I not witnessed all four waterfalls. The first waterfall, though glorious, could only be admired from afar. The second waterfall brought us closer in proximity, but we were still not close enough to see the finer details of the waterfall. As we came to the third waterfall, one could reach out and touch the water, or dip his toes in a pool. But by the final waterfall, one could be totally immersed in the roaring water, and even go behind the water into a little cave! I understood then how the trail was designed so that trekkers would experience greater amazement at each new waterfall, eventually culminating in the breathtaking splendour of the final one. I realized then that He was teaching me not to settle for anything less than what He has intended for me. In the past,

I had struggled with holding on to lesser pleasures when I knew that He had so much more, far better than what I could ever think or imagine. The challenge has always been to let go and to trust in the goodness of my Father, like Abraham, who was willing to sacrifice Isaac in Genesis 22. He has never failed me whenever I surrender to Him.

Another valuable lesson that I learnt through the trek was to follow and trust the signs. 

I am not a mistake, but the daughter of a Heavenly King, and I was deliberately created to play a part in His kingdom. 
O King. But even if He does not, we will not serve your gods or worship the image of gold you have set up." (Daniel 3:17-18)

KEYS TO LONGEVITY

In one of my conversations with a dear classmate, we were talking about life after graduating from the BCW. Our experience here has been marked by God moving in great measure and we began discussing about longevity in the ministry. At that moment, we both fell silent and a tangible fear of the Lord gripped our hearts, as the thought of not finishing well was very sobering and plausible. It is easy to claim to love the Lord completely in the midst of His presence and manifestation, but what happens when we are placed in an environment completely foreign and devoid of His works and wonders?

That very night, I felt led to read the book of Acts. The Lord reminded me of the church of Ephesus in chapter 19, outlining the birth and explosive growth of the church. Verses 5 to 10 introduces Paul's church plant beginning with the doctrine of baptisms. There was also dynamic evangelism taking place in the hall of Tyrannus for two years and all the inhabitants of the province of Asia, both Jews and Greeks, heard the Gospel. The Bible is a book of truths and never exaggerates - everyone did hear the gospel and multitudes turned to the Lord! In the following verses, not only were miracles being performed, but certain Bible translations coined

these "extraordinary miracles" because what happened then was so astounding. In addition, people were also getting delivered from demons and the fear of the Lord fell on everyone in the city!

What happens from verses 21 to 29 gets even better because it displays the extent of the power of the Spirit in Ephesus. The gospel penetrated the city so deeply that it changed the socio-economic sphere. The Ephesians, previously religious pagan worshippers, ceased purchasing idols and shrines from silversmiths as they were now converts of Christ! The extent of this transformation was so exceptional that Demetrius, a silversmith frustrated by the loss of business, gathered other idol-making silversmiths to incite a riot which forced Paul out of the city. Still, the work progressed with mighty demonstrations of the Holy Spirit, and there was a true revival in Ephesus. To put the cherry on the cake, the church had two wonderful church leaders - Timothy, who pastored the flock, and also John, the great apostle who was an elder. If men of such high calibre and might were teaching and building the church - surely the church would fare well?

The answer is found in the book of Revelation, where Christ Himself addresses seven churches. He highlights the Church of Ephesus in chapter 2:2-3, saying: "I know your works, your labour, and your endurance, and that you cannot tolerate evil. You have tested those who call themselves apostles and are not, and you have found them

to be liars. You also possess endurance and have tolerated many things because of My name and have not grown weary." Jesus commends this church and all seems well until verse 4, which highlights their error: "But I have this against you: You have abandoned the love you had at first. Remember then how far you have fallen; repent, and do the works you did at first. Otherwise, I will come to you and remove your lampstand from its place—unless you repent."

It may seem shocking - but good works and good doctrine are not exactly what Christ is after! Though the church in Ephesus seemed to have it all - Spirit-filled Bible teachers, authentic doctrine, great discernment, and endurance, they lost the one thing that fuelled their faith - their love for Jesus! In spite of their glowing accolades, they were rebuked for missing the mark, and were given a stern warning.

Yet Christ in His goodness gave the Ephesians a two-fold solution that would restore the position they had lost: they were instructed to repent for abandoning the love they had for Christ, and return to what they did at the start of their walk with God. I believe the keys to longevity in ministry are contained in Acts 19:17-19, which was also what Christ was reminding the Church of Ephesus to do.



"This [an earlier incident] became known to everyone who lived in Ephesus, both Jews and Greeks. Then fear fell on all of them, and the name of the Lord Jesus was magnified. And many who had become believers came confessing and disclosing their practices, while many of those who had practiced magic collected their books and burned them in front of everyone. So they calculated their value and found it to be 50,000 pieces of silver."

Firstly, not only were the Ephesians filled with a reverence and awe of the Lord, they actively magnified Him by proclaiming His works. As believers, we are encouraged to testify of Him regularly. Secondly, they confessed their sins and repented of them, putting aside their pagan beliefs. In like manner, we need to come before the Lord and repent of the things that displease Him - putting to death the thoughts that opposed the teachings of Christ. Thirdly, they even went

so far as to burn literature though they had to forego the silver spent on acquiring them, and this illustration speaks of doing whatever it takes to ensure that we put a stop to sin and destroy every foothold of the enemy! Many times, we do not go all the way when it comes to dealing with the strongholds in our lives, displaying partial obedience. We do not want to be like King Saul who spared Agag though he received clear instruction to destroy the Amalekites in 1 Samuel 15. As much as it is inconvenient or seemingly disadvantageous to us, we want to be fully obedient to our Master!

Christ is not just in the business of deconstructing our old patterns and ways of thinking, but He is also in the business of reconstruction so that we put on His mind and think His thoughts. It does not matter how long we have been Christians. We need to apply these keys in our lives daily. We ought to continually thank Him, testify of His goodness, and confess and repent of sin so that He can set us free from every encumbrance. God is our advocate and we should recognise that we can run to Him, not away from Him, when we sin. Finally, we must determine in our hearts to establish roadblocks against sin, cutting off the roots of temptation and deceit in our lives. If we bear these points in mind, we can ensure that we not only will start well, but will end the race well. We will be able to say with confidence, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith." (2 Tim 4:17)




